October 26– Robert Bradley– Institute for Energy Research, CEO

Robert L. Bradley Jr. is the founder and chief executive officer of the Institute for Energy Research, a 501(c) 3 educational foundation with offices in Houston, Texas, and Washington, D.C. His major affiliations are as an adjunct scholar of the Cato Institute and the Center for Energy Economics at the University of Texas at Austin. Bradley, who holds a BA and MA in economics and a PhD in political economy, received the Julian L. Simon Memorial Award in 2002 for his work on free market approaches to energy sustainability.



Bradley is author, most recently, of Capitalism at Work: Business, Government, and Energy (a book dedicated to Charles Koch), an application of the capitalist worldview to corporate and energy controversies.

Bradley's other major books are: The Mirage of Oil Protection (1989); Oil, Gas, and Government: The U.S. Experience (2 volumes: 1996), and (with Richard Fulmer) Energy: The Master Resource (2004), which Milton Friedman described as a "splendid" book that "effectively debunks the widespread predictions of energy doom."

Bradley, has also published numerous essays pertaining to government intervention, with particular application to energy markets. His public-policy approach combines an understanding of the historical record with market-process economics and libertarian social theory.

October is Vocational Service month in Rotary. As business leaders, Rotarians share their skills and expertise through Vocational Service. Rotary's emphasis on Vocational Service dates back to the very beginning of our organization. Since the founding of Rotary in 1905, we have always stressed high business ethics. A Rotary Code of Business Ethics was adopted at the 1915 convention and in 1943, Rotarians were provided an additional tool to help them achieve their Vocational Service goals when the 4-Way Test was adopted as an official component of Rotary ideals.

Sometimes referred to as the "forgotten" Avenue of Service, Vocational Service is alive and well in our club. We have an active Interact club at Wichita East High School led by Boyce Soward. We hold an annual Career Day that allows our Rotarians to share their vocation with local high school students, and a very large number of our members wear their Rotary Pin on a daily basis in the workplace. In addition, we proudly display the 4-Way Test banner at our weekly meetings. We have some very nice 4-Way Test posters on parchment paper in the Rotary office suitable for framing and displaying in your office. If you would like one, just let me know.

During this month, I encourage each of us to reflect on how we can use the workplace as a way to advance the high ethical standards of Rotary. By doing so, we will be shining examples to youth, as well as building character among employees, associates and the community in general. Teresa heard about the WHFH program from her uncle, who is a "Weekday Wonder" volunteer with Habitat.

Teresa has already proven herself to be dedicated to accomplishing this goal for herself. She completed 50% of her sweat equity hours in just 5 weeks, earning herself a spot on the fall build schedule.

Teresa believes that God has led her down the path to Habitat and believes it is more than a coincidence that she will be living on a street that shares her last name.
