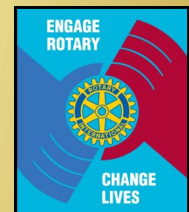

June 9 — Wayne Bryan and Music Theatre Performers



Wayne Bryan is now enjoying his 27th season as Producing Artistic Director for the newly renamed Music Theatre Wichita.

In the course of his tenure here, Music Theatre has grown from a theatre with a budget of \$800,000 a year to the most highly subscribed non-profit arts organization in Kansas, with a budget of \$3.4 million, at least 70% of which is annually spent back into the local economy. Combining education with professional theatrical production, Music Theatre Wichita has been internationally praised for its quality. It has also proven to be a significant economic booster for the city, the region, and the state.

Unlike most musical theatres, all the shows seen at Century II during the summer months are created locally, using a unique mix of Broadway guest artists working hand-in-hand with talented young Midwesterners. Five Broadway-scale shows are built and presented within Century II during an intensely creative 10-week period, and Wayne and his team are constantly exploring new shows and new technologies, in addition to the classic titles and traditional approaches that have proven so successful.

The upcoming season includes four returning shows, each not seen here for at least a decade, and one brand new Broadway title. The season begins with a 65th Anniversary production of Rodgers and Hammerstein's Pulitzer Prize winning *South Pacific*, with its compelling story and classic songs like "Some Enchanted Evening" and "There Is Nothing Like a Dame." The dynamic dance show *West Side Story* follows, leading up to the season's all-family musical *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*. The regional premiere of the snappy new chase caper *Catch Me If You Can* follows in late July, and the season ends with a spectacular new production of the tap dance extravaganza *42nd Street*.

Raised in southern California, Wayne performed on Broadway in *Good News!*, *Rodgers and Hart*, and *Tintypes*, and on television in such shows as *M*A*S*H* on CBS, *Keystone* on A&E, and *American History* on PBS. He has directed award-winning productions all across the country, from San Diego's Old Globe to New York's City Center, but feels he's doing his most challenging and rewarding work now. He is especially proud that so many young MTWichita alumni are currently performing on Broadway and all around the world. About 40 are appearing on Broadway right now!

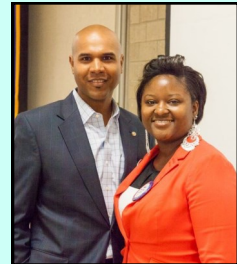
