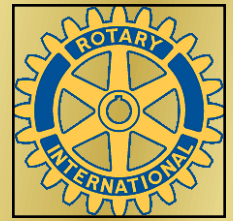

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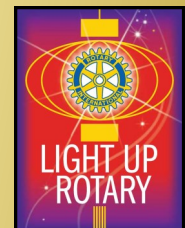

The Cancer No One Talks About

While breast cancer rightfully receives tremendous public attention because 1 in 8 women will develop it, few know that 1 in 7 men will develop prostate cancer in their lifetimes.

Prostate cancer is as lethal as breast cancer and its treatment can have a lasting effect on both the survivor and his family. Tools for detection of prostate cancer are also in question, as some groups have recommended against the once-standard annual PSA test to screen every man 50 or over. Dr. Ayham Farha of Wichita Urology Group will provide an update on prevention, detection and treatment for this all-too-common disease and its impact on survivors.

Dr. Farha received his medical degree from the American University of Beirut in Lebanon. He completed his internship and residencies in the specialties of surgery and urology at State University of New York Health Science Center in Syracuse, NY. Board certified by the American Board of Urology, Dr. Farha has been in practice since 1989 and has been with the Wichita Urology Group since 1991.

J. Edgar Hoover's FBI and the Fourth Estate: The Campaign to Control the Press and the Bureau's Image

J. Edgar Hoover was director of the FBI from 1924 until the day he died in 1972. Among the secrets to his longevity were the relationships of the FBI and members of the Fourth Estate, the news media. The FBI's public relations division, the Crime Records Section, categorized journalists as friends or enemies. Friends were courted and provided with controlled access to Bureau information, a valuable commodity given the popularity of FBI crime stories. Enemies were added to security lists, investigated, monitored and generally treated like criminals. The net result was that the news media provided Hoover with an "objective" defense of his Bureau, trumpeting a mythical public image of restraint that obscured the FBI's often illegal efforts to monitor and control dissent.

Matthew Cecil, Ph.D., is Director of the Elliott School of Communication at Wichita State University. A native of Brookings, S.D., Cecil worked seven years as a political reporter, political press secretary and corporate media relations specialist. Cecil earned a Ph.D. in Mass Communication from the University of Iowa in 2000. He has previously served on faculties at Purdue University, The University of Oklahoma, and South Dakota State University. A media historian, Cecil is the author of *Hoover's FBI and the Fourth Estate*, published in 2014. He is currently working on a new book, *J. Edgar Hoover's PR Men*. Cecil and his wife, Jennifer M. Tiernan, Ph.D., a professor in the Elliott School of Communications, have a 10-year-old son, Owen.

Message from President Arlen Honts

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

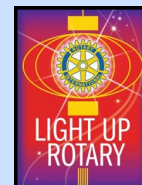
I want to thank the club for sending me to the Rotary International Convention in Sydney, Australia. It was a great experience. I appreciate the opportunity to attend. Let me tell you two things that I learned at the convention.

I was privileged to meet the 2014-2015 Rotary International President, Gary Huang, at a luncheon for incoming club presidents. President Gary also gave the keynote address at the closing plenary session. President Gary is the first Chinese (Taiwan) president of Rotary. His theme for 2014-2015 is "Light Up Rotary." He explained that he chose this theme to celebrate the connection between his Chinese culture and the culture of Rotary. President Gary shared that the idea for "Light Up Rotary" comes from the Chinese philosopher Confucius, who stated that "It is better to light one candle than to curse the darkness." President Gary analogized that we Rotarians — at the individual, club, district and Rotary International level — are single candles joined together to overcome the darkness. He added that each project we do adds to the overall light of Rotary around the world.

Another plenary speaker that I really enjoyed was Dr. Bruce Aylward, the assistant director-general of the World Health Organization. Dr. Aylward shared the progress that Rotary is making toward eradicating the world of polio. He stated that one year ago in June, 2013, only 50% of the children in the world were safe from polio. By June, 2014, 80% of the world's children were safe from polio. Dr. Aylward told us that we have completely eradicated two of the three strains of polio. Only nine countries have active reports of polio, and of those nine countries, eight have fewer than five cases. Only Pakistan has numerous cases of polio. Dr. Aylward is confident that the world will be free of polio within the next five years.

You can be proud of the accomplishments of Rotary. Locally, as you read for RIF, swing a hammer for Habitat, or do any number of other things, you truly are helping to "Light Up Rotary."
