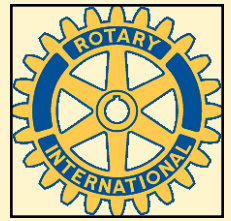

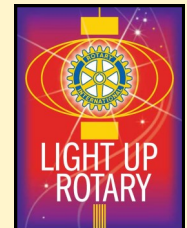

February 23 — Karen Countryman-Roswurm, LMSW, PhD

Founder and Executive Director, WSU Center for Combating Human Trafficking (CCHT)
Assistant Professor, WSU School of Social Work
Founder Anti-Sexual Exploitation Roundtable for Community Action (ASERCA)

Topic: *Combating Human Trafficking: Because Even One Abused and Exploited is One Too Many*

While human trafficking is often publicized as modern-day slavery, the fact is that this form of abuse and exploitation is not modern at all. Rather, throughout history, both labor and sex trafficking have been noted as the mostly widely accepted and covert forms of violence perpetrated against vulnerable and marginalized populations. With this in mind, Dr. Countryman-Roswurm's presentation will assist Rotarian members to develop an increased understanding of the definition, scope, and extent of human trafficking. Rotarians will learn about cases of human trafficking in Kansas and will receive information on what is being done — technically and adaptively — to address this form of maltreatment. Lastly, Rotarians will gain ideas on how they too might intentionally and effectively join the anti-trafficking movement.

Karen Countryman-Roswurm, LMSW, PhD, has more than two decades of personal, professional practice, and community-based research expertise in the anti-trafficking movement. With various first-hand vantage points, and operating from a strengths-based social justice perspective, she has served locally, regionally, nationally, and internationally as a street outreach worker, project coordinator for gender-specific programming, therapist, community response organizer, human rights advocate, and public policy developer. Specifically, she has acted as a forerunner in advancing broad-based community awareness, human trafficking prevention programming through use with her Lotus Prevention for Prosperity™ Curriculum, effective identification and intervention strategies through use of her Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking - Risk and Resilience Assessment™ (DMST-RRA), and methods of trauma-informed direct-practices for multidisciplinary professionals who serve young people who are subjugated to, and/or who have survived, sex trafficking through use of her Lotus Victim to Vitality™ Program Model. Dr. Countryman-Roswurm serves as the Founder and Executive Director of the Center for Combating Human Trafficking and is an Assistant Professor in the School of Social Work at Wichita State University. March 2 — Larry Welch, Former Director of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation

Topic: *Kansas' Criminals and the KBI's Role Through History in Catching Them*

Kansas' rough-and-tumble days didn't end with the Wild West. As Larry Welch, 10th director of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation and author of the book "Beyond Cold Blood: The KBI from Ma Barker to BTK" will share with us, such notorious characters as Pretty Boy Floyd and Bonnie and Clyde operated within the state. More recently, the BTK killings and capture are all too fresh in our memory. Welch's book, named a 2013 Kansas Notable Book, will be available after the meeting.

Welch's presentation combines Kansas and KBI history with behind-the-scenes stories of the investigation and crimes that made the headlines of the day. Welch was director of the Kansas Bureau of Investigation from 1994 to 2007 and also served as a special agent and supervisor for the FBI from 1961-1986, as well as associate director of the Kansas Law Enforcement Training Center until he was appointed to lead the KBI. Welch earned a bachelor's degree and a law degree from the University of Kansas. His extensive writings have appeared in law enforcement publications including "Kansas Peace Officer and Kansas Sheriff."
