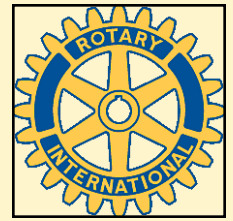

August 17 — David Beaty
Head Football Coach — University of Kansas
Topic: *I've Landed the Perfect Job and There Is No Place to Go But Up*

David Beaty took the reins of the Kansas football program Dec. 5, 2014, with more than 20 years of coaching experience, including two previous stints as an assistant coach with the Jayhawks. A native of Garland, Texas, Beaty takes over the KU program after spending three previous seasons as the Texas A&M wide receivers coach, where he also coordinated all the recruiting efforts during the 2013 and 2014 seasons. Under Beaty's tutelage, the Aggies' wide receivers have been a record-setting group. With first-team All-American Mike Evans leading the way in 2013, the Aggies set team records for receiving yards, receiving touchdowns and completion percentage.

Beaty came to Texas A&M after serving as offensive coordinator at both Kansas and Rice. He spent the 2010 season as the offensive coordinator at Rice, where he helped the team average 28.7 points and 375.3 yards per game. Prior to his second stint at Rice, he was the wide receivers coach at Kansas during the 2008 and 2009 seasons.

Beaty spent the 2006 and 2007 seasons as the wide receivers coach at Rice. In 2006, he served as passing game coordinator as the team made its first bowl game in 45 years (the New Orleans Bowl.) He is a 1994 graduate of Lindenwood College in St. Charles, Missouri where he played football and served as a team captain from 1992-1993. He and his wife, Raynee, have two daughters, Averie and Alexa.



August 24 — Anthony Mattivi
Assistant U.S. Attorney for the District of Kansas
Topic: *Fighting Terrorism and Crime in an Increasingly Hostile and Dangerous World*

Tony Mattivi has been an Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Kansas for more than fifteen years, prosecuting federal violations including drug trafficking, violent crime, racketeering, gangs, organized crime, money laundering and terrorism. He also has briefed and argued cases in the Tenth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. He sits on Department of Justice's Capital Case

Review Committee, which reviews capital-eligible federal cases and makes a recommendation to the Attorney General whether or not to seek the death penalty.

For nearly five years, Mattivi was detailed to DOJ's National Security Division, which assigned him to the Office of the Chief Prosecutor for Military Commissions. He was the lead prosecutor on the case against the high-level al Qaeda operative who masterminded the bombing of the USS COLE in Yemen in 2000. In 2007, Mr. Mattivi spent six months working for DOJ's Regime Crimes Liaison Office in Baghdad, Iraq, advising and assisting the Iraqi High Tribunal with the trials of members of Saddam Hussein's regime for war crimes and crimes against humanity.

Mattivi prosecuted Terry Lee Loewen, the former U.S. Marine who recently pled guilty to attempting to detonate a van filled with what he thought were high explosives at the Wichita airport on behalf of al Qaeda during the Christmas travel season. He is presently prosecuting John T. Booker, who is charged with trying to detonate a truck bomb at Fort Riley on behalf of ISIS.

Mattivi graduated with honors from the Washburn University School of Law in 1994.
