



November 16 — Rollin Karg
Karg Glass Gallery Owner and World-Renowned Artist
Topic: *The Long and Winding Road to Accidental Success*

The artistic works of local artist Rollin Karg can be found in galleries and public places all over the world. His pieces combine two artistic mediums — blown glass and sculpted metal. For more than thirty years, Karg has been working with glass, creating everything from paperweights to abstract sculptures. Most of his glass pieces contain transparent colors with striking bursts of color. His love of metal sculpting began with an outdoor sculpture show for Larksfield Place, a retirement home in Wichita.

Karg owns a studio and gallery in Kechi, where he creates and sells his work. Born in Columbus, Ohio and raised in Miami, Florida, he was the grandson of a building contractor and the son of a carpenter. You might say working with his hands was in his DNA, however, his parents urged him to obtain a college degree hoping his life would be easier than theirs. He studied business administration at Wichita State University and worked for various businesses as an industrial engineer, including Cessna Aircraft Company.

Karg dabbled in pottery, photography and woodworking, until two things turned him to glass art. The first was a relationship with Richard Stauffer, who taught glass art at Emporia State University. He enrolled in Stauffer's class and drove 190 miles roundtrip 3 times a week for a semester. He fell in love with glass blowing after he produced his first paperweight two weeks into Stauffer's class. The second was a trip to Corning, New York, where he toured a glass factory and saw glass blowers at work. This trip sealed his passion for the craft. With his wife Patti and their family's support, Rollin went about making glass blowing a vocation. Judging from his work and reputation, he followed the right dream.

Topic: *Behind the Curtain with Savvy Branding*

Bill Gardner is the president of Gardner Design, which has produced effective and award-winning results for such industry leaders as Spirit AeroSystems, Kroger, Cargill, Wichita State University and many more. He is the founder of www.logolounge.com, the international, cross-referenced compendium of logos from the world's leading corporate identity designers. He authored the best-selling book series *LogoLounge Volumes 1 through 9*, as well as the first four volumes of the LogoLounge Master Library Series: *Initials and Crests*, *Animals and Mythology*, *Type and Calligraphy*, and *Shapes and Symbols*. Gardner also released a foundation textbook for students, educators and professionals called *Logo Creed: The Mystery, Magic, and Method Behind Designing Great Logos*.

Gardner speaks nationally and internationally on identity trends and logo development. He is the author of the annual LogoLounge *Logo Trend Report*, published by Graphic Design USA and other publications throughout the world. The *Trend Report* is released each year in May, and has even been revealed live, including at HOW Design Live. Gardner recently became the first recipient of the Fellow Award from the AIGA Wichita chapter for his contributions to the local, national and global design community.

Bill and his wife, Andrea, have one daughter, Molly, who is a student at K-State.




