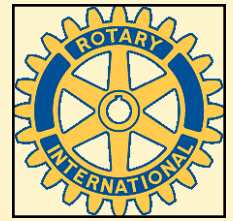

March 21 — Dr. J. C. Combs
Musician, Author and Lecturer
Topic: *My Life in a Small Town*

Dr. J.C. Combs, a Professor Emeritus of Percussion at Wichita State University, is today one of the most sought out speakers in the area for talks ranging from Abraham Lincoln to Tin Pan Alley. After retiring from the university in 2006, Combs embarked on a second career as a lecturer, sharing information on subjects that both fascinate him and call upon his continual quest for learning. On March 21, he will treat us to an entertaining discussion about growing up in a small town, sharing stories which are documented in a book he co-wrote with his sister, Barbara, titled *Clearmont: Life in a Small Town in the 1940's and Early '50s*.

Numerous audiences have been enlightened by his knowledge and enjoyed his humor and ability to bring to life such topics as the music of the Civil War, the assassination of Abraham Lincoln, popular music of the 19th century, music of the '50s and the music of Tin Pan Alley. He currently is researching the music of World War I to add to his repertoire.

Combs began his teaching career at the University of Oklahoma where he received his doctorate degree. He taught at the University of Missouri at Kansas City before joining the WSU School of Music in 1970. Among numerous honors bestowed upon him during his tenure at WSU was the Kansas Regents' Award for Outstanding Teaching and the Leadership in the Advancement of Teaching Award.

Through the Yamaha, Zildjian and Latin Percussion corporations he continues to make guest appearances at universities as a featured clinician, guest conductor and performer.

He also participated on several CD projects, including a recording with the American Sinfonietta, conducting the WSU percussion ensemble's CD, *World Influences*, and both performed and conducted a Warner Bros. CD featuring Indiana University percussion professor Steve Houghton. Combs has had 13 compositions published and distributed by C. Alan Publications.



March 28 — Dr. Don Blakeslee
WSU Professor of Anthropology and Archeologist
Topic: *Ark City's Ancient Indian City of "Etzanoa"*

Not many have heard of Etzanoa. Not yet that is. Researchers believe they have discovered the "great settlement" described by the explorer Don Juan de Oñate. Etzanoa was said to have stretched for 5 miles and housed 20,000 ancestors of the Wichita tribe near the confluence of two rivers. In a study led by Dr. Don Blakeslee, it was confirmed that Etzanoa once straddled the banks of the Walnut River in modern Arkansas City, Kansas. It is believed that Etzanoa is the second-largest pre-Columbian Native American settlement in the United States, and possibly the largest.

Blakeslee is a professor of anthropology at Wichita State University. He specializes in the archaeology of the Great Plains. His research interests range from the time of the earliest settlement of the Americas to the historic period. His work has carried him from Montana to Texas. Blakeslee also has had a long-term interest in native trails and sacred sites. His major contributions include numerous publications on the Middle Ceramic period and on radiocarbon dating. Currently, his work focuses on the protohistoric period and on the Walnut River basin during all time periods. Blakeslee has served as president of the Professional Archaeologists of Kansas and of AASCK, a society for amateur archaeologists.
