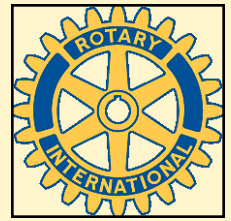

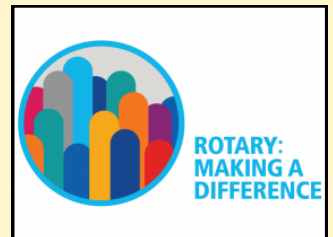

September 25 — Mike Aresco

Commissioner - American Athletic Conference

Topic: *Why Wichita?*

On July 1 this year Wichita State University left the Missouri Valley Conference, its home since 1949, to join the American Athletic Conference (AAC). Mike Aresco has served as commissioner of the AAC since 2012 during which time he has overseen a strategic reinvention of the conference.

Among the milestones reached in his tenure have been the introduction of the AAC Football Championship in 2015 and the launching of a dynamic Power 6 branding campaign. These align the AAC with its peer conferences and celebrates the competitive success that the conference has enjoyed at the highest level of collegiate competition.

In the wake of the changes created by college sports realignment, Aresco has solidified the conference. He led negotiations that resulted in television contracts with ESPN and CBS Sports, which have given the conference unprecedented national exposure and branding with the two industry leaders in sports television. He organized the process whereby the conference was renamed the American Athletic Conference – a name that has been accepted nationally – and he also oversaw the process that resulted in the conference's popular graphic identity.

Aresco is a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Tufts University (B.A., magna cum laude, history), The Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts (M.A., international relations), where he held a John Moors Cabot Scholarship and the University of Connecticut School of Law (J.D.). He practiced law privately in Hartford, Connecticut, for several years.

He and his wife, Sharon, have two adult sons.



October 2 — Dr. Jeremy Deutsch

**Medical Oncologist / Hematologist
Cancer Center of Kansas**

Topic: *Winning the Fight Against Cancer*

Nearly half of us will, sometime in our lifetime, be diagnosed with cancer and about half of the people diagnosed with cancer will die from it.

However, medical science is developing ways to harness the power of our immune system to kill cancer cells and also developing and using targeted, small molecules to disrupt the growth, progression and/or spread of cancer. Dr. Deutsch will discuss these new treatments which may save your life or the life of a loved one.

Dr. Deutsch, born and raised in Wichita, graduated from Kansas State University with a degree in Electrical & Biomedical Engineering. He then obtained his medical degree from the University of Kansas – Wichita in 2010. Dr. Deutsch went on to complete his internal medicine residency at the University of Kansas Medical Center – Wichita, during which time he was named the Outstanding Second Year Internal Medicine Resident in 2009. He received the St. Luke's Award for Outstanding Performance across all residencies in 2010.

Dr. Deutsch completed a three-year fellowship in Hematology and Oncology in 2013 at the University of Iowa, serving as chief fellow during the 2012-2013 academic year. He is board certified in internal medicine, medical oncology and hematology. He is a member of a number of professional societies including the American Society of Clinical Oncology, American Society of Hematology, American College of Physicians and Alpha Omega Alpha. Dr. Deutsch serves on the Institutional Review Board for Via Christi Health and also demonstrates commitment to clinical research through his service as a principal investigator with the Wichita NCI Community Oncology Research Program (NCORP), a National Cancer Institute sponsored research program.
