APRIL 23 — BOB LUTZ, FORMER SPORTS WRITER AND FOUNDER OF LEAGUE 42

TOPIC: HITTING A HOMERUN FOR WICHITA YOUTH

Bob Lutz is a native of Derby, Kansas and a graduate of Wichita State University. He went to work for the Wichita Eagle newspaper in 1974 where he worked until his retirement in 2017, including 20 years as a sports columnist. During his career, Lutz had a vision of founding an urban baseball league in the heart of Wichita, which would be accessible to youth whose economic situation prevented them from participating in the great sport of baseball. In 2013, aided by other supporters, League 42 was launched as a non-profit baseball league and it will celebrate its five-year anniversary this summer.

League 42 has grown from 16 teams and 200 youth in the first year to 42 teams and 575 youth in 2017. The City of Wichita has expanded the baseball facilities at the north end of McAdams Park which contributed to the growth. League 42 serves boys and girls, ages 5 through 14, and requires a \$30 participation fee per child or per family with more than one child.

Bob and the other supporters of League 42 believe this opportunity has struck a chord with Wichita and he hopes to combine his love of baseball and helping youth for many years to come.



APRIL 30 — JOE SCHILLACI, HOMICIDE DETECTIVE FROM A & E's FIRST 48 HOUR REALITY SERIES

TOPIC: INSIDE MY PRISON OF DARKNESS

Captain Joseph Schillaci is a retired homicide and undercover narcotics detective with over 30 years experience on some of the meanest streets in Miami, Florida. Joe was featured on A&E'S First 48 crime series and has been featured on Dead Again and Miami City Vice specials.

Schillaci's passion for speaking and presenting have taken him all across the country where he speaks to business groups, law enforcement academies, swat negation teams, veterans and schools where he shares his insight on anti-bullying, stress management, and extending forgiveness to others to make a difference. Joe's book *Inside My Prison of Darkness* depicts his personal struggle with post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) along with his life experiences surrounding his career in law enforcement.

Schillaci has served proudly as a lieutenant in the community affairs section which oversees and supports various community involvement programs. He is a certified nonviolence counselor and has developed and produced anti-gang and anti-bullying campaigns to make people aware of the damaging effects of both physical and emotional violence. He uses his leadership and relationship-building skills, along with his wisdom as a body language expert, to motivate and inspire others.

Joe is a husband and father working as a private investigator in Wichita, Kansas. He enjoys traveling and spending time with his family.
